

The Stockton University Coastal Research Center (CRC) completed the spring survey #54 between May 28 and 29, 2019, the first of two scheduled seasonal surveys of the municipal beaches in 2019. Semi-annual shoreline and sand volume changes were calculated between survey #53 (conducted in November 2018) and survey #54 to determine changes over the 2018 to 2019 winter storm season and review changes to the Corps project on the Borough beaches. This spring northeast storms commenced on March 22 and 23, 2019. The most intense storm occurred April 2nd with 30 MPH winds. May 12th saw the last event duplicating the previous Mother's Day with a northeaster. The summer thus far has seen extensive periods of southeast winds which generate northerly sand transport. The trend is evident on the cross sections, evidenced as significant berm development.

The latest US Army Corps of Engineers project utilized sand obtained by the State of NJ from Hereford Inlet, followed by the majority of the placement volume coming from Townsend's Inlet. The USACE was prohibited by the Dept. of the Interior from mining sand from the authorized borrow site in Hereford Inlet due to a recent re-interpretation of the language in the 1982 Coastal Barrier Resource Act.

This situation continues into 2019 with Avalon, Stone Harbor and North Wildwood contemplating litigation, or at least congressional intervention with the Dept. of the Interior opposing this position. This fall should produce progress on this situation.

Stone Harbor Beach Performance

The 2017 maintenance effort was conducted by the NJ State Div. of Coastal Engineering and the USACE. The combined effort with State and federal sand supplies resulted in 320,000 CY (from Townsends) plus 394,000 CY (from Hereford), totaling 714,000 CY in new sand added to the municipal shoreline.

Table 1 displays the semi-annual changes in shoreline positions and sand volumes from the recent survey #54 conducted in May 2019 to survey #53 from November 2018. Shoreline changes are calculated by comparing the zero datum positions in the recent survey to the previous survey. Sand volume changes are expressed in cubic yards of sand per linear foot of beachfront (yds³/ft.); the total beach volume change is calculated using this value. The distance (cell width) between groins along the beachfront of Stone Harbor was measured between the centerlines of adjacent groins. Each cell's net sand volume change is computed by multiplying each cross section volume change by its corresponding groin cell width.

Northeast storm damage was relatively minor with the majority of the losses seen at sites SH-82 and SH-103. Losses were almost universal, occurring at 7 of 8 sites. Only SH-123 achieved a modest sand volume gain. These losses amount to -95,825 cubic yards of sand across each entire profile transect.

The view of the cross sections prompted creation of Table 2, which displays the same comparisons in time, but the values of sand volume change reflect just the beach and dunes above the zero elevation datum. The shoreline advances or retreats remain the same, but all 8 profiles show decent gains in sand volume above the zero elevation position.

Each site's shoreline position retreated multiple feet landward except for sites SH-108 and SH-123. The beach became narrower, but grew vertically as sand accumulated on the berm raising its elevation. All eight sites gained sand on the beach totaling 81,250 cubic yards. Since the entire width of the transect evaluation in Table 1 showed a 95,825 cubic yard net loss, evaluating just the offshore regions shows they lost 177,074 cubic yards as sand was transferred south or further seaward.

Individual Site Descriptions

Below is a review of data collected at each of the eight individual sites. A photo is included for each location to show conditions as of May 2019. Comparison plots are provided to show beach and nearshore profile changes from the spring of 2018 to spring 2019. The April 2018 survey, #51, was taken following the worst northeaster during the spring of 2018.

SH-82, located at 82nd Street, this beach received sand later in 2017 tied to the CBRA issue and federal funding. This May 28, 2019 view shows the sand accumulated at the dune fencing over the past winter and a wide beach looking north towards Avalon.





Figure 1. View to the north at 82nd Street. The photo was taken on May 28, 2019. The new fence poles installed following the USACE work are now nearly buried in wind deposited sand.

SH-90, located at 90th Street this beach also received sand during spring of 2017 adding 44.63 yds³/ft. The seasonal changes were seen on the beach as sand moved onshore.





Figure 2. View to the north taken from the foredune toe on May 28, 2019. The beach is wider as a result of the USACE project and the wind has added sand to the dune toe promoting grass development seaward of the fencing.

SH-95, located at 95th Street this site received sand by June 12, 2017, providing a 99-foot wider beach as 53.73 yds³/ft. were placed above the zero elevation. The beach remains in decent shape with sand added to the dunes this spring.





Figure 3. This foredune toe view to the south taken May 28, 2019, shows the handicapped access ramp and sand accumulation at the fencing to the south.

SH-103, the 103rd Street beach gained sand at the dune fencing practically burying the most recently placed fence (2017). The berm developed into a prominent feature as well.





Figure 4. View to the north at 103rd Street taken May 28, 2019, showing extensive sand deposition around the 2017 fence installation. The site retained the wider beach and saw no dune damage this past winter.

SH 103- This site received 118.75 yds³/ft. in new sand generating the generous berm and offshore taper into the bar trough. This spring the beach gained 3.97 yds³/ft. almost all in the new berm. Sand moved onto the beach contributing to a 16.19 yds³/ft. sand volume loss below the datum. More material moved further offshore than moved onto the beach.

SH-108, the project beach at 108th Street was restored by March 27, 2017. Since the project, the dunes have added sand as the grass planted in 2017 has taken root.





Figure 5. View to the south taken on May 29, 2019. The wind-transported sand added to the foredune came from the beach as spring conditions favored sand transfer from offshore onto the beach.

SH 108-The berm, greatly enhanced by early spring deposition added 11.11 yds³/ft. to the beach and dunes. Offshore the bar system contributed 13.49 yds³/ft. to both the beach and deposition further seaward. The shoreline retreated just a foot making this site even more accretional than 6 other locations.

SH-112, the 112th Street beach re-nourishment was completed by March 27, 2017. The new fencing is all but buried by May 28, 2019 and the beach width remains excellent.




Figure 6. View to the south taken May 28, 2019 along the foredune crest. Dune development is extensive and occupies the majority of the USAACE beach template.

SH 112 - Sand was added to the foredune area and generated a substantial berm by late May. The beach gained 5.24 yds³/ft. while the offshore region lost 7.99 yds³/ft. This site was better balanced between beach gains and offshore losses. The shoreline retreated 36 feet due to the accretional steep beachface.


SH-116, This location also has wide dunes with foredunes advancing onto the USACE beach template. The fencing is nearly buried and the beach berm has developed this spring.

SH-123, site 123 is located just north of the terminal groin and the start of South Point. A new fence line has yet to accumulate sand, but traces of deposition are evident. A decent-sized berm developed on the beach this spring.





Figure 8. View to the south taken on May 29, 2019, looking along the dune crest. The storm scarp edge has been muted by wind deposition and sand slumping to mute the slope steepness.

Summary

Putting 714,000 cubic yards of new sand on Stone Harbor beaches during 2017 continues to provide extensive storm protection and great recreational prospects. This spring, the berm and sand accumulations on it and in the dunes have made the beaches sand positive across all eight sites surveyed. Since each site is central to each groin cell, the conclusion is that the beach is in good shape moving into the fall season. The offshore areas did supply the majority of the sand added to the beach, but it also shed more material further offshore in some cases, while allowing sand to migrate south in others. The 123rd Street site was the only one where sand accumulation since November was positive across the entire transect's length. An 81,000 cubic yard gain by late May is a good start of the summer season.

The CRC's next semi-annual report is scheduled for early in the fall 2019 to assess the Borough beaches following this excellent summer time period.

ORDINANCE 1555

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 466 (Subsections 1 & 5) OF THE
GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF STONE HARBOR**

Whereas, Borough Council deems it to be in the best interest of the Citizens of Stone Harbor to amend the within ordinance; now, therefore be it ordained by the Borough Council, the Governing Body of the Borough of Stone Harbor, New Jersey as follows:

Section 1. Article 466.1 is hereby amended to include the following definition:

BULK WASTE ITEM: Bulk waste items shall include, but is not limited to, small and large appliances, furniture, mattresses and box springs, carpeting not to exceed 50 pounds per roll, doors, and windows. **Bulk waste item does not include:** construction and demolition materials, appliances containing freon and or refrigerant and kitchen or bathroom fixtures such as sinks and toilets.

Section 1.1. Article 466.5 is hereby amended to include the following as new Section D:

The above notwithstanding, there shall be no prohibition against any person collecting, removing, or picking up bulk items that have been placed in the public right of way for collection; however, no one shall remove any items placed on private property.

Section 1.1a Article 466.5 is hereby further amended to reflect that existing Section D shall now be designated as Section E.

Section 2. If any portion of this ordinance is determined to be invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, that determination shall have no effect upon the remainder of this Ordinance, which shall remain valid and operable.

Section 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies only, are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as provided by law.

ORDINANCE 1556
AMENDING CHAPTER 560
OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES
OF THE BOROUGH OF STONE HARBOR 2005

(Freestanding Signs – Sandwich Board Type)

Section 1. Chapter § 560 is hereby amended as follows:

[Amend § 560-32 B (3) as follows]

(3). Signs shall extend from or be attached to buildings on the lot wherein the business to be advertised is located, and such signs shall not extend beyond the front property line, except that a sign may be affixed flush against a building which encroaches over its property line as long as no hazards for people walking by is created and as long as said sign has a depth or thickness of no more than four inches. Signs shall be located on the building at the particular floor level of the business only, so that, for example, a business on the second or third floor may not have its sign located at the first-floor level of the building. No signs shall advertise a business not located within the building to which the sign is attached. ~~Freestanding signs and~~ Signs on the top of the building shall not be permitted. This Subsection B (3) shall not apply to projecting signs.

~~3 (a) Freestanding signs and signs on the top of the building shall not be permitted from Memorial Day to Labor Day. They will be permitted from the day after Labor Day to the day before Memorial Day according to the following rules:~~

- ~~1. No more than one (1) sign per business~~
- ~~2. Permitted only when business is open~~
- ~~3. Shall not exceed 36 inches in height and 24 inches in width~~
- ~~4. Must not be in the public right-of-way (shall not extend beyond the property line)~~
- ~~5. Shall not have any type of lighting whatsoever~~
- ~~6. Must immediately be taken down in inclement weather~~

~~Add a section to Business Permit Registration referring to Free Standing Sign Rules and have permittee sign acknowledgment that they understand the rules.~~

3 (d) Temporary advertising devices, signs, flags, banners and other symbols. No device, including sign, banner, flag, balloon or symbol of any type, used for temporary advertising shall be permitted unless it complies with all Borough sign and flag ordinances and a permit has been obtained from the Construction Official of this Borough. Any such advertising device shall be permitted only once in any calendar year and for a period of time not to exceed 10 consecutive days. ~~Temporary signs conforming to section 560-32 B (3) (a) will be exempt from this constraint~~

Section 2. If any portion of this ordinance is determined to be invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, that determination shall have no effect upon the remainder of this Ordinance, which shall remain valid and operable.

Section 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies only, be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as provided by law.

A RESOLUTION CREATING AN INTERLOCAL SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH WILDWOOD CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE USE OF THE RECREATION FIELDS AND TENNIS COURTS OF THE BOROUGH OF STONE HARBOR

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40:8A-1 *et seq.*, authorizes municipalities and school districts to enter into agreements for the purposes of exchanging, sharing and cooperating with regard to services common to said communities through Interlocal Services Agreements ; and

WHEREAS, the Wildwood Catholic High School is in need of services relating to the use of recreational playing fields of the Borough of Stone Harbor for use by its High School soccer teams for the Fall of 2019 for games and practices; and

WHEREAS, they have also requested the tennis courts for use by its High School girls tennis season in Fall of 2019 and boys tennis season in the Spring of 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Stone Harbor has certain lands, equipment and personnel available to meet the needs of the Wildwood Catholic High School in this area; and

WHEREAS, entering into an Interlocal Services Agreement with the Wildwood Catholic High School for this purpose has been deemed to be in the best interests of citizens of the Borough and the students of the Wildwood Catholic High School; and

WHEREAS, in consideration of this Agreement and in an effort to supplement the costs of maintenance of Borough facilities, Wildwood Catholic agrees to pay the Borough the sum of \$1,500.00 per sport, per season for maintaining the fields/courts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Stone Harbor, County of Cape May, State of New Jersey that the preamble of this Resolution is hereby incorporated by reference;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this 3rd day of September, 2019 that the Borough of Stone Harbor and Wildwood Catholic High School hereby agree, under the authority of N.J.S.A. 40:8A-1 *et seq.*, as follows:

1. Wildwood Catholic High School agrees to pay the sum of \$1,500 for soccer (boys/girls) and \$1,500 for tennis (boy/girls) for a total of \$3,000 and shall have full access to and use of the recreational ball fields and the tennis courts of the Borough of Stone Harbor located in the vicinity of 80th Street and Second Avenue, for recreational activities officially sanctioned and conducted by the Wildwood Catholic High School and according to the schedules submitted and attached.
2. Soccer teams for the Fall of 2019, games and practices, Tennis Courts for girls tennis season, Fall of 2019 and Boys Tennis, Spring of 2020. Practice will be every day as of Wednesday August 21, 2019.
3. Such access and use shall be conditioned upon coordination with and approval by the Recreation Director of the Borough of Stone Harbor with the understanding that the activities of the Borough of Stone Harbor Recreation Department take precedence.
